## Meet AWIU President Nancy Annick



Nearly 60 years ago, a group of visionary women set out to build an international community of women that would transcend national borders and foster friendship and goodwill among nations. That founding commitment, to build bridges of understanding and cooperation among women leaders worldwide through nonpartisan citizen diplomacy, is reflected in our mission and continues to guide everything we do.

I'm proud to share that 2024 saw several years of thoughtful and deliberate work come to fruition. Building on the foundation of our 2021 five-year strategic plan, AWIU entered 2024 ready for meaningful growth and advancement. We welcomed 27 new members, launched a Greater New York chapter, planned our upcoming delegation to India, and hired an Interim Executive Director to help us recruit our next leader. We are delighted that Rachel Unkovic will join as AWIU's Executive Director in January 2025.

Our programs continue to grow and make a real difference. In March, we hosted the sold-out 17th Annual International Women of Courage Celebration, honoring 12 remarkable women who have demonstrated exceptional courage and strength in advocating for peace, justice and human rights. Honorary Chair Billie Jean King delivered an inspiring message to the Awardees. We supported 15 grassroots organizations around the world through micro-grants, and celebrated that program's meaningful impact at the "Women Investing in Women" gala in Chicago. There, we honored longtime member Barbara Rubio with the 2024 Bernice Behrens Founder's Award.

Our youth programs are also thriving. Over 100 students attended the Career Opportunities in International Relations (COIR) Symposium in Washington, D.C., to learn about international STEM careers. With 14 inspiring speakers and hands-on networking, it was our most impactful symposium yet. Our Passport to the Future program expanded to 16 students, who worked with mentors on projects that deepened their understanding of global issues. We also welcomed our first Global Education Fellow.

As I reflect on this past year, I'm filled with gratitude – for our founders' vision, for the enduring friendships we've built, and for the trust that connects us across cultures. In times of global uncertainty, these personal bonds serve as powerful bridges for peace.

Thank you for standing with us and making our work possible. I look forward to all we will accomplish together in the years ahead.

## Our History

- AWIU begins with a focus on international learning and connection through study, symposia, and travel. An AWIU delegation of American women leaders travels to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to meet with members of the Soviet Women's Committee, the first such group to do so in decades. Dozens of delegations have since followed.
- The grants program is founded to support projects that are women-led, that have an impact beyond the immediate need, and that focus on health, education, and entrepreneurial development.

The International Women of Courage (IWOC) program collaboration with the U.S. Department of State begins.

- The Passports to the Future program launches and connects young women, typically students or those just beginning careers in international fields, with opportunities for professional skill building, networking, and mentorship.
- The annual one-day Career Opportunities in International Relations (COIR)

  Symposium in Washington, D.C., takes place for the first time. COIR brings young women and leaders in the field together for practical advice, inspiration and networking.
- AWIU receives the Gender Champion Award from the Secretary of State's Office of Global Women's Issues at the 15th Annual International Women of Courage Celebration.





#### **Active Chapters**

In 2024, AWIU continues to thrive with seven active chapters where members connect, plan events, and engage with global issues. Additional chapters are in development as interest grows across the country.

This year, chapter members have played a vital role in organizing key annual events, including the *International Women of Courage* Celebration in Los Angeles and the Career Opportunities in International Relations Symposium in Washington, D.C.—both of which saw strong participation and meaningful engagement.

### 2024 Programmatic Highlights

In 2024, AWIU's core programs—Delegations, Passports to the Future, Career Opportunities in International Relations, Global Micro-Grants, and the *International Women of Courage Celebration*—collectively made a meaningful impact. This year alone, these initiatives:

- Engaged 128 AWIU members across programs, events, and initiatives—reflecting strong member participation and a shared commitment to AWIU's mission of fostering international understanding and supporting women globally.
- Welcomed 16 Passports—the largest cohort to date—and launched AWIU's first Global Education Fellow to support mentorship, coordination, and program growth.
- Hosted the 2024 Career Opportunities in International Relations (COIR) Symposium in Washington, D.C., bringing together over 100 young women and men along with professionals in diplomacy, development, and global STEM careers. The event provided mentorship, networking, and concrete pathways for students entering international fields.
- Partnered with 15 grassroots grantees in 9 countries, including the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Nigeria, Uganda, Guatemala, Guinea, India, Kenya, and Tanzania. These micro-grant recipients implemented a wide range of high-impact projects—from maternity ward upgrades and farming education to library furnishing and women's health initiatives—reaching and positively impacting more than 5,000 people worldwide.
- Held the 17th Annual International Women of Courage Celebration in Los Angeles—a powerful and inspiring evening that honored 12 courageous women from around the world who have shown resilience, integrity, and extraordinary commitment in the face of adversity, demonstrating exceptional leadership in areas such as human rights, education, peacebuilding, and justice.
- Awarded \$86,000 in support of the 2024 IWOCs and micro-grantees, helping to further their work, amplify their voices, and sustain their momentum as changemakers.

## Delegations

Since its founding, AWIU has led 65 Delegations, visiting over 100 countries across every continent except Antarctica. These journeys have often marked historic milestones as the first group of American women to enter the country in decades: the Soviet Union in 1968, China in 1973, Saudi Arabia in 2002, and Libya in 2009. These trips exemplify AWIU's mission-driven commitment to fostering international understanding and meaningful exchange.

Delegations are designed to deepen members' understanding of the countries we visit and to promote meaningful connections between our members and women leaders in those countries. Delegation members engage with political leaders, business executives, leading women's groups, nonprofit organizations, embassies, educators, and community members. Our itineraries often include opportunities to connect with International Women of Courage honorees and micro-grant recipients. Each delegation returns with insights that are shared widely through presentations and digital communication.

In 2024, the Delegation committee focused its efforts on planning our next journey: a Delegation to India scheduled for January 2025. Working closely with the Board and broader membership, the committee has been preparing an itinerary rooted in AWIU's mission—ensuring opportunities for cultural learning, dialogue, and connection with women leaders and organizations doing impactful work across India.

#### Passport to the Future

AWIU's Passport to the Future program offers young women—typically students or early-career professionals under the age of 26—opportunities to gain critical skills and global perspective under the guidance of a dedicated member-mentor. By connecting the Passports with AWIU grantees and past IWOCs to produce research projects together, the program serves as a bridge for fostering cross-cultural understanding and advancing women's empowerment.

In 2024, the Passport to the Future program saw significant growth, welcoming 16 dynamic participants—the largest cohort to date. This year also marked an exciting milestone: the launch of our first-ever Global Education Fellow position. The Fellow provides direct support to both the program committee and the Passports themselves, enhancing coordination, mentorship, and learning opportunities across the board.

This expansion reflects AWIU's ongoing commitment to fostering the next generation of globally minded women leaders.

## Career Opportunities in International Relations

Since 2014, AWIU has sponsored the Career Opportunities in International Relations (COIR) Symposium, a one-day program in Washington, D.C., that provides young women the opportunity to engage with and learn from leaders in the field.

The 2024 Symposium focused on the theme "Women in STEM: Forging Global Impact." The event brought together an inspiring mix of over 100 high school and college students, Passports to the Future participants, women leaders from across the STEM and international affairs sectors, and local recruiters.

Through engaging panel discussions, networking sessions, and career-building workshops, attendees explored the intersection of science, technology, and global leadership—and left with new insights, connections, and inspiration to pursue careers that make a difference on a global scale.

## Global Micro-Grants Program

Since 2008, AWIU has awarded over \$542,000 in micro-grants to international organizations and initiatives that uplift women in the areas of health, education and entrepreneurship. These small but powerful grants are designed to support short-term concrete projects that make a tangible impact in local communities.

In 2024, AWIU partnered with 15 inspiring grantees around the world, including organizations based in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Nigeria, Uganda, Guatemala, Guinea, India, Kenya, and Tanzania. \$30,000 was awarded, with grants ranging from \$1000 to \$3000 each. Funded projects reflected the diversity of local needs and creativity—ranging from furnishing community libraries and providing agricultural training, to upgrading maternity wards and improving access to women's health care. While some organizations had received AWIU support in previous years, many were first-time grantees, broadening the reach and deepening the impact of the program.

### International Women of Courage

Since 2008, AWIU has collaborated with the U.S. State Department to recognize women around the globe who fight for human rights and the empowerment of women and girls. AWIU hosts the *International Women of Courage (IWOC) Celebration* annually and presents grants to every State Department honoree. To date, \$522,500 has been awarded by AWIU to the IWOC honorees, including \$56,000 in 2024.

The 17th Annual IWOC Celebration was a powerful tribute to 12 extraordinary women leaders from around the world who have demonstrated unwavering courage and resilience in the face of adversity. Hosted in Los Angeles, the event honored their remarkable contributions across a wide spectrum of critical global issues—including the advancement of education, employment, entrepreneurship, environmental sustainability, gender equality, healthcare, housing, human rights, journalism, legal reform, peacebuilding, and youth empowerment. With moving stories of impact and determination, the evening celebrated not only the individual honorees but also the collective power of women leading change in their communities and beyond.




#### Grants Breakdown
